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Reducing health inequalities in Bristol

The 2014 All-party parliamentary report 'Dementia does not discriminate' states that a 2-fold increase in people living with dementia amongst the White British population is predicted by 2051. During the same timescale, a 7-fold increase is predicted for people living with dementia amongst Black, Asian and minority ethnic communities. Cultural perceptions of dementia in these communities can differ and raising awareness is critical, so that knowledge is gained and dialogue opened to reduce the stigma with which dementia is often associated.
