

## **Inspiring Dementia Action**

### in Bristol Schools



## September 2023

Last academic year was incredibly busy! More than 20 Bristol schools and colleges engaged throughout the year, resulting in nearly 7,000 pupil interactions, which equals the optimum engagement level prior to the pandemic. Pupils ranged from 4-18 years old and settings were located citywide. Secondary school pupils recalled sessions from when they were in Primary school, and it was brilliant to see a deepening knowledge and understanding of dementia, more positive attitudes towards the condition and an increase in skills and confidence. All of these aspects are truly enabling young people across Bristol to become more dementia friendly and make a difference to lives, as illustrated by the many stories heard within families and the wider community. We are immensely proud of our work and cannot wait to work with as many of you as possible this school year. We are particularly interested in working with schools whose pupils are from more diverse backgrounds and Post 16 settings, as well as schools and colleges wishing to participate in sessions involving people living with dementia. Sessions were both inspiring and heart warming. The lead teacher said;

### Spotlight on Oasis Academy Brislington

It has also been fabulous working with Oasis Academy Brislington this year. Following on from a presentation delivered alongside the charity Alive! as part of the One Good Turn Project in Term 2, the lead teacher invited us to deliver assemblies to each year group during Dementia Action Week in Term 5. These were co-planned and co-delivered with students from the School Academy Council Community strand, receiving great feedback from both staff and students.



It was joyful to consequently see the students interact with residents living with dementia in their matched care home as part of the project. The casino night was great fun!

The school have since been given an award by Bristol Dementia Action Alliance for increasing dementia awareness in their school community. Well done to you
